"The monument is for the Hong Family, it was set up on 9th Sept. 1989 and there are generations of the Hong folks buried on the site. The main tribute says: The Hong family are in this Hong Town, on the high hills one can see beautiful rivers and mountains for a thousand years; the monument is facing the grand sea, three rivers together flow into it for thousand and thousand years to come".

Now is better than never.


Although never is often better than *right* now.

Zetland Hall, the home to Freemasonry in Hong Kong.



Freemasonry first reached China on the Prince Carl, a ship of the Swedish East India Company.

The freemasons on board had a document giving them permission to hold meetings whenever

they entered a port and they did so in Canton (Guangzhou) in late 1759.

The records of the Grand Lodge of England show that in 1768, Lodge Amity No. 407 was meeting in Canton; however, it had ceased working by the end of the century.

Two lodges were established in Hong Kong soon after the British acquired the Territory. The older one, Royal Sussex Lodge No. 501 EC (named after the Duke of Sussex, who was then the Grand Master of the English Freemasons) was warranted on 18 September 1844. It later moved to Guangzhou, then on to Shanghai and only returned to Hong Kong in 1952. The second lodge, Zetland Lodge No. 525 EC was warranted on 21 March 1846. Zetland Lodge claims seniority over Royal Sussex Lodge as it has remained in Hong Kong since its formation. Other Lodges were established over the following years.

The first Masonic Hall in Hong Kong was built in 1846 by The Zetland Lodge No. 525, English Constitution and was named Zetland Hall in honour of the Lodge that built it. The Zetland Lodge itself was named as a compliment to the then Grand Master, Thomas, Second Earl of Zetland, who was The Grand Master of the United Grand Lodge of England from 1844 to 1870.

In 1865 this hall was replaced by a second larger and more impressive building in Zetland Street in the Central business district. This second Zetland Hall lasted until 1944 when it was destroyed by American bombing, Hong Kong then being under Japanese occupation.

Between 1945 to 1950 the Freemasons of Hong Kong met in temporary premises while a site for a new hall was found. Work on the third and present Zetland Hall at No. 1 Kennedy Road began in 1949 and was finished in January 1950. The Hall was dedicated to Masonic use in an impressive ceremony on 30 January 1950.

Zetland Hall on Kennedy Road, is a Masonic Centre owned and operated by the lodges that meet in this city. Currently there are 29 lodges with over 1,500 members, and several orders that meet under the auspices of the Grand Lodges of England, Ireland and Scotland, but enjoy considerable local independence.
